Through this experience there were many things that I learned. Patience and adaptation where two main things that I learned. This was a hard concept for me because I do not believe that teachers are there to entertain students, they are there to educate students. In order to effectively educate there might need to be an entertaining element. I also learned that it is helpful to be aware of everyone's needs. When you do not know all of the students' needs some of them will crash

and burn during the lesson. Without the proper accommodations they will also feel frustrated and not know what to do to help themselves. It is then up to the teacher to show them that they can do it and show them how to reach success.
