### I. OBSERVATIONS PRIOR TO ASSESSMENTS

#### A. Parent/Guardian Information

I have known Brock ever since he was little. His mom informed me that he was born around a month premature. She thought there would be some disabilities, but so far he has as normal of a life as you could expect.

#### B. Educational Background

Brock has gone to McKinley school in Fergus Falls since he was in kindergarten. His mother has always worried about Brock in school, even though every teacher he has had, has always remarked how bright and engaged Brock is. Brock can read well for his age, he understands most of what he reads, but some might be confusing for him.

### II. OBSERVATIONS AT THE START OF THE ASSESSMENTS

I assessed Brock in the comfort of his own home. We started the test around 10:30 am, and finished around 5 pm. We had a few breaks in between for him. We also finished the test the next day. That test started at 9 am and finished at noon. Brock responded very well, I thought that he might be a little silly because I am a family friend. Brock, for a third grader, was very attentive and concentrated. He powered through tests like it was his job! Brock was very willing to be tested. Towards the very end he was getting a little fatigued, but he still gave a good effort. Brock was very curious to as why I was testing him. After telling him he seemed to understand.

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Reading Attitudes Survey:

I used the Garfield test to start with Brock. The Garfield test is a test that sees how much a student likes a certain something. For this case it asked lots of questions on how Brock feels about reading, both in class, and outside of class. His results showed me that he likes reading in class, but doesn't love it outside of school. Brock scored a 26% on his recreational, 33% on his academic reading, and a 59% overall. Brock scored a 94% on the test. He only got 9 names wrong. He had smaller mistakes such as pronouncing Bateman, Batman. Brock needs to work on the following: Long vowel E, or the bossy E, short vowel W, short W, Vowel Digraph,

QRI Test: A reading comprehension and fluency test.

Brock's comprehension frustration level is in the early 5th grade. Brock can read the text, but he doesn't fully understand what he is reading. Brock's instructional level is late 4th grade.

Brock is independently reading and fluent into late 4th grade. His independent comprehension level is between late third and early 4th grade.

As I have said before, Brock struggles with comprehension, he understands most of the texts, but can't retell them as well as he reads them.

Brock's reading rate is right about where he should be. His reading rate does not hinder his comprehension of the texts.
